HOW TO GET TO THE BALMORAL BOWLS CLUB

For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is Map 160, Reference Q12.

<u>From the Gateway Arterial</u>—turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Colmslie RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the City—go</u> across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Colmslie RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the west (old Cleveland Road</u>—Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right. Jean Howie Drive goes through the park (the entrance to the drive is near the boundary of the Bulimba Cemetery). Go about 350 metres along the Drive and turn right into the Bowls Club car park.

NOVEMBER 2001 MEETING

A substantial number of around 65 members and supporters turned out for our final meeting for the year.

Starting at the earlier than usual time of 7.30, Doug Thoresen had arranged a performance by what he called the "old and bold" from the Ormiston/National Service Bands to start off the night.

Rob Grogan, Frank Bruce, John Manfield, Noel?, Jim Stevenson, Laurel Foo, John Wilson, Doug Thoresen.

Rob Grogan was the first performer. Rob started off by playing on a nice smooth sounding instrument. It's been some time since we've heard Rob and he's obviously been working hard, turning out such a nice sound, combined with good musical expression. Next was Frank Bruce from the Gold Coast. Again a nice musical performance of light marches. John Manfield was next, starting with *The Barren Rocks* on a

steadily blown pipe. Next was Noel (didn't get his surname) and he played *Waters of Kylesku* and *Highland Cradle Song*. Next was John Wilson followed by Laurel Foo. Jim Stevenson, truly a veteran of piping in this part of the world, although better known for playing the Bass Drum in the QIA Band when Sandy Campbell was Pipe Major, was the last of the group to play.

Finally they all played together with the tune being *Flower of Scotland*, a fitting introduction to the last meeting of the year. Progressively they were joined by Doug Thoresen on banjo! Striking up again, the same ensemble played *Cockney Jocks*.

Next Doug introduced Andy Gorrie, one of the three Pipe Majors of the National Service Band (along with Doug himself and Les Gray), playing his electronic bagpipe and he gave us a selection of musical tunes. The instrument showed off the traditional fingering well, although it definitely had an "electronic" sound.

While the previous performances were in progress, Bob Payne had been collecting entries for the Veterans Contest. For this contest, we had a bench of Veteran Judges, Sandy Campbell and Roy Gunn! There were four competitors.

The first was Gordon Ferguson. On a fine sounding pipe which needed just a bit of a touch before he started to give plenty of volume and resonance, he tarted off with 2/4 Marches Dornoch Links and Greenwood Side. Into the strathspey Campbelltown Kiltie Ball and then the reels Dancing Feet and Sleepy Maggie where he got a little lost. A quick retune and he continued! He finished up with the air Loch Boisdale, the hornpipe Wee Man from Skye and jig The Curlew. Throughout he showed fine fingering and good expression and control. a pity about the getting lost bit! The drones drifted just a little as he went on, perhaps due to the very hot and humid conditions.

Iain Bruce was next to play. On his usual quiet but full toned and resonant instrument, he was virtually straight into his tunes, starting with *Lewis Turrell's 2/4* and the 4/4 *Dr Cam Stewart*. After this musical and relaxed start, he played the air *The Crookit Bawbee* and then into the jig *David Ross*, rendered nice and quick but with definite phrasing. A contrasting change into the 2/4 *Duncan McColl*, then a strathspey we didn't get the name of and the reel *Sleepy Maggie*.

Our next competitor was Hugh MacLean. On his usual strong sounding pipe he started out with the 6/8 *Macleod of Mull*.

Following that he played *Setting Sail for Lewis*, *Gruinneard Bay*, *Tha mi Duceeread* (Airs) and finally the strathspey Lady MacKenzie of Gairloch

Bill Sharpe was our last competitor. A good strong pipe and well blown one again. His first tune was the fine 2/4 Father John MacMillan of Barra. He followed this up with Rose Among the Heather, Big Billy in the Bog, Farewell to Skye, Jack's Jig and Calliope House.

While the judges deliberated, Phillip Cowan, from the other end of the age spectrum, gave us some tunes, restricted almost entirely to ones of a "traditional" bent, starting with the 6/8 Ballochyle, He then played part of Lament for Alistair Dearg MacDonnell of Glengarry, Major Manson, The Sheepwife, The Massacre of Glencoe and The Walrus. Phillip's playing continues to improve, with his phrasing becoming more consistent with just a couple of cases of piper's block towards the end in the quicker stuff.

Our Patron Maurie DeHayr then presented the prizes, the placings being as follows:

Doug Thoresen then presented a gift to Desley McConnell for her hard work in organising supper and the door throughout the year.

The raffles were drawn and won by Bob Payne (whisky) and Robert Baker (shortbread) before all retired for our usual sumptuous Christmas supper.

Prince Charles Band finally gets its upgrade

Readers will remember the controversy about the McTarnahan's Prince Charles Pipe Band from San Francisco which was not allowed to play in Grade 1 at last year's World Championships despite having won Grade 1 the year before (they subsequently came 4th in Grade 2). They have now been upgraded to Grade 1 by the RSPBA - apparently the sticking point was that their association was not officially affiliated with the RSPBA. Neil Readshaw, a former Vice President of this Society plays with Prince Charles.

European Pipe Band Championships to be held in mainland Europe Plans are being made by the RPBA to hold the European Championships in Alden Bilzen, Belgium in September 2003. This is one of the initiatives being taken by the RSPBA under its new management and direction and is the first example of an RSPBA contest being held other than in the British Isles since the Intercontinental Pipe Band Championships in Toronto in the 1970's.

Piping Centre changes its name and financial status: The Piping Centre, which readers will remember was established in 1998 with Roddy MacLeod as its Director after a magnificent refurbishment of a disused church in Glasgow has received a grant of £300,000 from the Scottish Ministry of Sport, Arts and Culture and is to become the National Piping Centre. This is a tribute to the hard work and vision of all those behind the venture and adds further depth to the support of Highland Piping at its source.

New Captain John MacLellan Memorial Trust to support the composition of Piobaireachd. This new trust, started with a gift from John MacLellan's widow, will promote a Piobaireachd composing competition, with the first one closing in November 2003 (a traditional tune with taorluath and crunluath). The list of trustees contains some impressive piping names: Allan Beaton, Colin R. MacLellan and Malcolm MacRae. This is a fitting memorial to a man who had such a superlative career on the solo boards in both the big and the light music, along with his massive contribution to Army piping and piping in general as the successor to Willie Ross as head of the Army School of Piping. The address of the Trust is John MacLellan Memorial Trust, Lochbay House, Stein, Waternish, Isle of Skye, IV55 8GA Scotland.

lan Duncan and Gordon Duncan join Scottish Power. After his year off after resigning from Vale of Atholl after 36 years (all but 10 of those years as Pipe Major), Ian Duncan has joined Scottish Power, headed by Roddy MacLeod of the National Piping Centre along with his brother Gordon who was a guest at our Society last year. Scottish Power has a long heritage, extending back to the British Caledonian Pipe Band of a couple of decades ago. The Band performed on 26 January at the "Piping Day" of the Celtic Connections festival in Glasgow. Field Marshal Montgomery Pipe band also performed on the day.
