HOW TO GET TO THE BALMORAL BOWLS CLUB

For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is Map 160, Reference Q12.

<u>From the Gateway Arterial</u>—turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Colmslie RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the City—go</u> across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Colmslie RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

From the west (old Cleveland Road—Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right. Jean Howie Drive goes through the park (the entrance to the drive is near the boundary of the Bulimba Cemetery). Go about 350 metres along the Drive and turn right into the Bowls Club car park.

FEBRUARY 2002 MEETING

About 35 members and supporters turned up for our first meeting of the year. We also had apologies from Dave Sinclair, Bob Payne, Roy Gunn, Brian Wright and Les Gray.

Doug Thoresen started out the evening with a few light tunes. He then mentioned the passing of Princess Margaret, Stewy Thompson and Hugh McInnes. He reminded us that Princess Margaret was Colonel in Chief of the Royal Highland Fusiliers. The Pipe-Major of the regiment played *The Desperate Battle* at her funeral.

As an aside Doug mentioned that the Governor General played the pipes in the school band so perhaps we should take that into account in our estimation of him.

Doug welcomed all to the Society year and mentioned our solo contest on Easter Monday and the visit tonight of the smallpipe group. He also welcomed Jimmy Macintosh to the meeting and gave a bit of his history. Jimmy, who is visiting family on the Gold Coast from his home in Pittsburgh had been brought along by Iain Bruce.

Matthew Supranowicz was first to play. He had a good firm pipe and launched straight into the heavy 2/4s *Hugh Kennedy* and *Miss Elspeth Campbell*. Next were the similar weight strathspey *Susan Macleod* and reel *Lt Col D.J.S. Murray*. He showed good phrasing and emphasis throughout. After a retune he was into 6/8 time with *Ellenor* and another tune he couldn't remember the name of. Apart from a couple of slips of concentration this was a very competent performance.

Next to play was Ryan Hofmann on a strong pipe and again into the 2/4 marches to start. His playing was more deliberate than Matthew's playing and the expression suffered a bit from this. Most of his execution was very good marking him as a

promising player for the future. After a retune he was into some jigs, again fairly deliberately played. After a quick wipe of the brow he was off again, this time into the some kitchen music, some of which were perhaps played a little too quickly. His tunes included Lady Louden, Flora MacKenzie's Favour, Lindsay's Jig, The Whistling Postman, Clancy's Jig, Johnny the Tree Lopper, Calliope House, Cape Breton Fiddlers and The Dakabin Runaway.

Next to play were our guests on smallpipes, Malcolm McLaren and Kyle. Malcolm, who makes smallpipes, mentioned their regular group meeting which is on the first Tuesday of the month in the QPBA rooms. Malcolm has identified 28 sets of smallpipes in Brisbane. The playing started with Kyle playing some tunes by Hamish Moore on a set of pipes in D, rigged up with a microphone and speaker to help us all hear properly.

Malcolm played next on a pipe in D. Later he changed to a pipe in A, which he explained is an octave lower than Highland Pipes and much mellower in tone than the pipe in D.

Finally Malcolm played a set of border pipes he copied from a set sent to him by wee Donald Maclean. These were actually illegally exported from Scotland as they are classed as antiquities. He played a range of tunes of a pastoral type.

All in all this was an interesting insight into another branch of the piping art.

Doug mentioned the sponsors we have for the Easter contest. He then introduced Brian Hornig of the *Raising the Standard* magazine. Brian spoke about his contacts with other Celtic groups in connection with spreading information via *Raising The Standard*. He advised the Wynnum Highland Gathering was going ahead this year again and suggested the Society have a stall there with various sets of pipes and use it as a recruiting drive. This suggestion was well received. The date is 28 September.

Our next player was Phillip Cowan. Again a strong pipe and accompanied by Doug Thoresen on a strong electric guitar! They played a few "busking tunes", Scotland the Brave, Marie's Wedding, Barren Rocks of Aden, Highland Laddie and Brown Haired Maiden. Then Phillip went on to play some more tunes on his own. He gave us quite a long and varied selection including She Walked Through the Fair, The 6/8 Machine, Captain Colin Campbell, The Big Flit, Crusaders, Wings, The Rustic Bridge, Ass in the Graveyard, MacArthur Road, Areile's Big Day, The Walrus, Itchy Fingers and Clumsy Lover.

Second last to play was Matthew Rigby on his usual full toned instrument, ranging over a wide sweep of music, all very capable played. The tunes included *Ellenor*, *Chief Steward Duncan McGillivray*, *Edinburgh City Police Pipe Band*, 74th Highlanders, David Ross, The High Level and Tam Bain's Lum.

Jimmy MacIntosh then had a few words. He commented that Australia is getting more like the US, although it didn't sound as though that was a criticism as he has made his home in the US! He urged younger pipes cut back the speed of their playing to gain expression and to remember that all music is in phrases and that this must be brought out in their playing.

Iain Bruce was our last player. On a bagpipe noticeably a bit lower in pitch than the others we had heard, but very tuneful, he started with some 3/4's - Lewis Turrell's 3/4 and The Dream Valley of Glendaruel. After a quick re-tune we heard the 6/8s The Princess Royal and John MacKenzie's Farewell to Strathglass. He finished off with the Piobaireachd I am Proud to Play a Pipe.

The time of 10 pm having now well passed, Doug brought the proceedings to a close after the raffle was drawn (won by Glenys O'Malley and drawn by Leon Bingham).

Bagpipe Maker Jimmy Tweedie Dies

James Tweedie was a turner with both MacPherson and Sinclair in Edinburgh in the 1950s and helped to develop the Sinclair chanter.. He ran his own pipe making business, Inveran House, in the 1970s and passed it on to Craig Scott, one of his apprentices, when he retired in the 1980s. Another one of his former apprentices, Brian Donaldson, has now also entered the business. Jimmy was well known for his meticulous standards in pipe making.

RSPBA Fails to Implement its Millennium Report

High hopes of a brave new direction for Pipe Bands in Scotland were unrealised when the RSPBA Annual Meeting failed to implement the reforms it had already agreed to in principle. The result is even more curious given that 59 Bands voted in favour, 22 against and 30 abstained. As a two thirds majority was required, the motion was defeated. It appears to be as hard to alter the direction of the RSPBA as to change the Australian Constitution!
