Among our visitors for the evening was Roddy MacDonald, the new Pipe Major of the Police Pipe Band.

Then to the piping. Joan O'Neill was our first player. On a nice firm sounding pipe she started with slow tunes. This was followed by a set of tunes in march time. Once again, she put on a Crook, reel Major D Manson, jig The Snuff very presentable and musical performance with good execution and phrasing with only a few minor glitches. Her tunes included Morag of Dunvegan, Rhu Vaternish, Two Ronnie's Maggies, My Land and Colin's Cattle.

Robert Baker was our next piper. conversation before he said he'd been having evening in terms of time signature and style some trouble with his pipes. Perhaps they lacked a little in tone but they were good and Corrienessan's Salute. His other tunes included steady. Robert had been working on some new tunes to play for us. He had a few examples of Haughs of Cromdale, The Back of Benachie, the dreaded pipers block but he gave us a varied 72nd's Farewell to Aberdeen and The Piper's selection including the 4/4s Wings and Gardens Cave, and the 6/8s 72nd's Farewell to of Skye, the 2/4 King George V's Army (after 3 attempts to remember the 3rd part!), the airs *She Kilrayock*. moved through the Fair and Steal Away and the reel Sleepy Maggie ...

Crusaders March, High Alexander Low of Tiree, Lady Louden, The Grey Bob, The Men From Skye and finally Brae Riach.

Our supper was next and with the big attendance there was much conversation and it was a bit difficult to break up!.

Band, was next to play. After a short time to Angus MacKinnon. The pipes were full toned but quite mellow in sound. His selection of tunes showed a logical progression through a range of time signatures and musical styles, all carried out with good phrasing and execution making a most enjoyable musical performance. His other tunes included the 2/4 Major Manson of Clachantrushal strathspey The Shepherd's Wife, hornpipe Bob Turner's Welcome to Cape Breton and jig The Geese in the Bog.

Our final piper for the evening was Iain Bruce. On a pipe with the drones and chanter singing together from the start Iain seemed to fill in In many of the gaps we hadn't heard during the finishing with the Piobaireachd up the 2/4 marches The Piper of Dundee, The Edinburgh and Captain Oldfield's Welcome to

And with that music still singing in our ears, we all set off home after yet another night of enjoyable piping.

Celtic Variety Concert - 6 April at Kedron Wavell Services Club

The big crowd that turned out to this concert were certainly treated to an excellent afternoon's entrtainment. Organised by the Celtic Celebration Committeee as a fundraiser for the Piping competition (see later in the newsletter), it drew on a great range of local and imported talent.

To start we had St Andrew's Pipe Band playing some more "traditional" 3/4s to start but then followed by their very "modern" medley, musch of it written by Matthew Rigby. With only six pipers the sound was absorbed a bit by the big crowd but this didn't detract from the excellent playing.

They were followed by dancers from Thistle Highland Dancing studio, starting with four dancers dancing a piece choreographed by Margaret Paterson to the tune "Maggie". This was followed by Craig Johnston dancing the Sean Truibhas, with his brother Brett playing the pipes.

Enough Scots performance – we were next entetained by the Irish band Rye Bark led by Steve Clausen. They sang a variety of songs from a number of backgrounds. This led up to the star turn for the afternoon, Fred Morrison.

Fred has a reputation for being a virtuoso of the bagpipe and he certainly showed this with a selection incorporating both more traditional and more modern music, with displays of improvisation thrown in as well. In the middle of his performance he changed instrument and gave us two tunes on the low whistle – *Passing Places* (referring to the passing places encountered on single lane roads in remoter parts of Scotland) and *The Old School House*, written for the house where Fred lives on South Uist. Back then to the pipes and he continued to show his total control of the instrument until the mid-concert intermission.

After the intermission, the Thistle Dancers were back. First Craig and Brett Johnston danced a Sword Dance and then with four of the girls danced a reel. This was followed by a change of pace with the harper David Hall. Among his pieces were one by Henry Purcell (English), a 15th century Irish piece written as acoompaniment to words of Francis of Assisi and a Spanish 18th century piece representing a dialogue between heaven and earth.

This put us in a ncie quiet mood to be got moving again by Fred Morrison. He started with a very well executed March, Strathspey and Reel and then rnaged once again across wide spectrum of types of music and tempos, finishing up with some of the really quick stuff to leave us remembering his virtuosity.

Celtic Celebration Committee Australasian Solo Piping Final

On 13 April a good crowd assembled at the excellent facilities of the Royal Queensland Yacht Squadron at Manly to hear nine pipers battle it out for the opportunity to go to Lorient to compete at the Interceltic Festival. We had three from Queensland (Adam Britten, Matthew Rigby and Jason Palfrey), two from New Zealand (Martin Frewen and Stewart MacKenzie), two from NSW (Barry Gray and David Thorpe), Tracy Murphy from Victoria and James Cowie from WA.

The judges were to be Fred Morrison, Nat Russell and Jean-Pierre Picard from Brittany. Unfortunately Jean-Pierre had been hospitalised and was unable to travel so Fred and Nat were left to do the whole job. Fred is a multiple winner of the Macallan trophy at Lorient and so is well placed to evaluate the performances of Breton music.

Each player had to first play an MSR and, after a short re-tune, a Breton selection of 5-7 minutes duration. After all had played and an interval in the program, they came back in the same order to play a 5-7 minute Irish selection. This made for a fairly long afternoon but certainly a very entertainng one.

Although one could pick the occasional imperfection in bagpipe or execution or expression, this really was a competition of a very high standard. Although your scribe doesn't profess to understand the Breton music yet, it is certainly an entrtaining part of the contest and one can hear the very wide variation in the music selected by the competitors.

The three elements of the contest are judged separately and the results combined.

In the MSR, Martin Frewen was the winner. His march I thought was a little cautious, but his strathspey had excellent lift and his reel went very well, all this with the execution pretty well free from error and a good steady pipe. Adam Britten was second. His march and and reel were probably about on a par with Martin, with the strathspey perhaps played a little square. Once again good execution and bagpipe. Third was Stewart MacKenzie. His march was excellent, played in a commanding style, and his strathspey and reel also had excellent lift. His pipe was one of the best sounding but there were some inconsistent birls in the strathspey and a slight loss of balance in the second part of the reel.

The Breton selection was won by Jason Palfrey. I thought his performance had good variety and was full of aspects with which I was not familiar – so I assumed that they are authentically Breton! Adam Britten was placed second and Martin Frewen third.

In the Irish selection, Matthew Rigby came first with an excellent performance that combined dexterity, musical expression and a good bagpipe. Jason Palfrey was second with another very good performance which just got a bit forced sounding form time to time, perhaps prompted by the pipes losing their edge a bit. Adam Britten was third with another good performance, but perhaps the selection was not constructed quite as well as the two who defeated him.

When the points were combined, the overall result was 1. Jason Palfrey

- 2. Adam Britten
- 3. Martin Frewen

Jason and Adam were actually equal on points but Jason was given preference because of his better performance in the Breton music. All three of the winners now go to the final in Lorient. In addition, Jason wins a set of McCallum Bagpipes and Adam and Martin both win a MacCallum Pipe Chanter. There were also trophies for the winners.

At the conclusion of the contest, Fred Morrison said he had been most impressed by the standard of playng and I think all in attendance would also have been impressed by the standard of organisation of the contest, for which the Celetic Celebration committee is to be commended. The committee comprises Kathleen O'Malley (Australasian delegate), Alan and Jane Hancox, Jeff Goward and Robert Wilson.

HOW TO GET TO THE BALMORAL BOWLS CLUB

For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is

Map 160, Reference Q12.

<u>From the Gateway Arterial</u>—turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Morningside RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the City</u>go across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Colmslie RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the west (old Cleveland Road</u>—Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right. Jean Howie Drive goes through the park (the entrance to the drive is near the boundary of the Bulimba Cemetery). Go about 350 metres along the Drive and turn right into the Bowls Club car park.
