SEPTEMBER 2003 MEETING

President Doug Thoresen started off the evening at about 8 pm. Apologies were received from Rosie McLelland, Dave Sinclair, Margaret Paterson, Innes Barker and Jack McCandlish. There were about thirty in attendance for our Pipers' night.

He publicised some coming events and also community radio station 4EB, mentioning that the Society is also becoming a member of the station in recognition of their great support in the past (and the future!).

He then introduced our first piper for the evening, Rob Grogan, who introduced his tunes, mentioning that he has been working on the third one for a long time and this is its first public performance. He played *Highland Cathedral*, *The Dark Island* and *Glengarrys Lament*. His pipe was sounding quite strong but he kept up the blowing well.

Next to play was Doug on a very steady and bright sounding pipe. He gave us a short selection including the air *Loch Rannoch*, 2/4 marches *Inveran* and *Dr R G MacKinnon*, strathspey *The Shepherd's Crook* and reel *The Rejected Suitor*.

Matthew Supranowicz was the next to play for us. He was in good form (building up for the Celtic Celebration Committee contest next month?). He played a strong and resonant pipe with a lot of confidence. His tunes included the 6/8s *Cameron MacFadyen* and *Andrew K Sloan*, 2/4 march *71st Highlanders*, strathspey *Susan Macleod*, reels *The Sheepwife*, *Lt Col D J S Murray* and *Miss Proud*, hornpipe *Lucy Cassidy* and jig *The Braes of Melinish*.

Rob Grogan returned to the floor to play us a few more tunes including *Red River Valley*,

Deep in the Heart of Texas, *Cockney Jocks*, *The Crusaders March*, *The Kiltie's Waltz* and *Sunset Retreat*.

In an evening of return performances, Doug Thoresen was back again with *Lochanside* and then the 6/8s *El Alamein* and *Dr Ross's Farewell*.

Maurie DeHayr must have thought we hadn't heard enough compound time tunes, so he started off with Alastair Hanning's fine 12/8 *Wellington Police Pipers in Australia*, the two "Major" 6/8's by P/M Hamish McColl, *Major May* and *Major Bobby* and the 6/8 *John D Burgess*. He finally gave us some relief with the air *Samantha's Lullaby* and the three 2/4s *Kantara to El Arish*, *John MacDonald of Glencoe* and *Arthur Bignold of Lochrosque*. Finally we were to hear the piobaireachd *Colin MacRea of Inverinate*. All this on a firm and resonant sounding pipe. It was good to see he is over his various winter viruses and back in the piping saddle with his fingers going well.

At this point we had our intermission for supper until enticed us back together by playing a couple ore tunes himself.

Iain Bruce then gave the "after supper" session with the 3/4s *Nameless* and *Craig Miller Castle*, the 6/8 *HRH The Duchess of Gloucester*, air *The Herding Song* and Jig *David Ross*. All this was in preparation for the final tune of the night, the piobaireachd *Lament for Mary Macleod*. As usual his bagpipe was beautifully balanced, with each note resonating properly with the drones

The performance was a fine finale to an excellent night of piping

A RETREAT FOR REGIONAL PIPERS AND DRUMMERS

was hosted by the Lockyer Valley Celtic Pipe Band
at Camp Duckadang over the weekend of Sept 5th 6th and 7th.

Sixty people turned out from as far north as Bundaberg, Maryborough, Gympie, Kingaroy, up on the dividing range to Toowoomba, several folk from the Sunshine Coast, Brisbane region and the Gold Coast, not forgetting of course Lockyer Valley.

The tutors for piping were Mark McKenzie and Angus Connor, both from Queensland Irish. Drumming tutors were Colin (Buzz) Ennis and John Ledger. David Booth from Buderim was the budding Drum Majors tutor. Rowena from Highland House attended, and set up a mini shop with all of the bits and pieces bandsmen need plus a wide range of music, sheet and CDs.

People started arriving late Friday evening to find that the hosts had arrived much earlier and had everything set up. After dinner there was a jam session with items, pipes and drums, and a banjo and a poem thrown in for good measure.

Saturday morning, after a great breakfast, we split into our various groups and the tutors took us through some theory and how to break up a new tune in order to master it, and then put us through our paces with some new tunes. Later in the day after some talk about chanter reeds and how to look after them we tuned up and did some marching with the pipes, drums and two budding drum majors.

The day came to an end far too quickly and after a wonderful evening meal the fun started. The four musical tutors gave a great performance followed by a line up of other great talent, including some items on the small pipes, and the banjo again. During the evening some of us were given the opportunity to view Mars and the moon through an on site observatory. The evening was a great success, some hardy souls managed to go through until 4.00 am.

After a straggly start on Sunday we went through a practical exercise of how to tune our drones, unaided. Quite a difficult task if one has always relied on some one else to do it. Most had a go with varying degrees of success.

Considering the wide range of experience that was represented at the camp there was something of benefit to be gained by all who attended. The tutors certainly gave us the benefit of their knowledge and experience. The general consensus of the attendees was that we need to continue with the retreats and that they had great benefits to the wider piping community as a whole, not only because of the gains to be had through the tutoring but the networking and friendships that are forged across band boundaries.

A big thank you to the Hosts and tutors and also the camp managers who catered for us. This was the third retreat and the biggest so far. Two camps have been penciled in for 2004, Jan 31st to 2nd Feb, and again in Sept 2nd to 4th, with two camps booked for 2005.

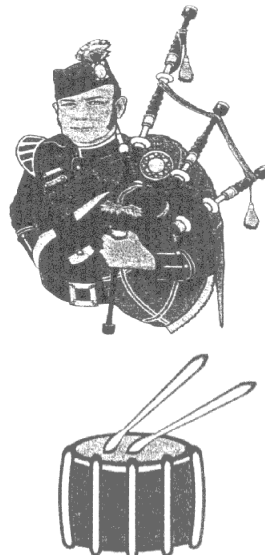

HOW TO GET TO THE BALMORAL BOWLS CLUB

For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is Map 160, Q12.

From the Gateway Arterial—turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Morningside RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

From the City—go across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Colmslie RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

From the west (old Cleveland Road—Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right. Jean Howie Drive goes through the park (the entrance to the drive is near the boundary of the Bulimba Cemetery). Go about 350 metres along the Drive and turn right into the Bowls Club car park.
