FEBRUARY 2004 MEETING

Only about fifteen members turned up to our February Pipers' Night, many no doubt deterred by the still warm temperatures at the end of Brisbane's "Heat Wave of 2004", and also the thunderstorms threatening. We had apologies from Ian Davidson, Margaret Paterson, Reg O'Malley, Alan and Jane Hancox and Matthew Rigby. The following day Bob Payne rang to apologise for himself and Roy Gunn – they had had to turn back to the Gold Coast because of the intensity of the storm!

Doug Thoresen welcomed everyone for the new year. He then called us to observe a minutes silence Minutes silence for those mentioned in the newsletter Jock McCabe, Bill Hannah, Rob McIntosh and Arthur Hinson.

Doug then introduced Hazel Osborne to play first and mentioned she was playing a set of Robertson bagpipes. Hazel mentioned she has been in WA for several years and felt very welcomed by the piping community there and had also felt welcomed in Brisbane. She was well dressed for the occasion. She played three slow airs: Hebridean Air, Fair Swan and James MacMillan's lament. The last named is her own composition. Her bagpipe was quite low pitched but very sweet sounding.

Next to play was your scribe. Despite a slightly shaky chanter reed and also some shaky fingers from time to time, he played most of *Rab's Wedding, Dr Ross, Dark Island, Highland Wedding, Train Journey North, Scotland the Brave* and *Marie's Wedding*. The "most of" refers to a couple of examples of the dreaded "piper's block", usually occurring at about the last measure of the tune!

Doug went into some of the history of some of the tunes played, Highland Wedding in particular.

Next Doug himself played. Because of his

injury to his shoulder he was not able to play for very long. He explained that the first tune was actually originally a pipe tune – he played *Bens of Jura* (known to most as Road to the Isles), *Lochanside* and the 2/4 March *Southall*. His pipe was fairly light but again quite resonant in tone.

Hazel then returned, this time with a selection more demanding on the fingers but executed very well: the march *Taking of Beaumont Hamel*, strathspey *Susan Macleod* and the reel *Lexy McAskill*. After ensuring that her chanter was firmly fixed in the stock (she had felt it move during the MSR) she played the jig *Alan MacPherson of Mosspark*.

Your scribe then took up the pipes again and played the other Macleod strathspey, *Dora MacLeod*, the reel, *Alick C MacGregor*, ³/₄'s *Balmoral* and *Green Hills of Tyrol*, and finished up with the air *The Swan on the Lake*.

At this stage we broke for supper, after drawing the raffle, and much animated conversation ensued.

When he thought we had talked enough, Doug played another few tunes to get everyone back together and went on to give us a slightly longer selection including *Duncan McInnes*, *Wadi Akirit, Maggie Cameron* and *Sandy Cameron*.

Hazel followed with the air *Tricia's Song* and the hornpipe *Pipe Major George Allan*.

To finish off the evening's playing, your scribe had another set of tunes: the 2/4 **Donald Maclean's Farewell to Oban**, the air **Highland Cradle Song**, three little reels and finally the hornpipe **Crossing the Minch**. By this time the chanter reed was finally fixing itself!

Once again, despite a small attendance we had an excellent piper's night.

APPRECIATION - BRUCE MORLEY

Obit: 6/1 1/2003

Bruce reappeared at Maclean's first Post War Gathering (c 1948) where the lately demobbed (RAAF) life assurance agent, good Piper and very good bloke continued his association with the Tamworth Pipe Band.

Thereafter we met with increasing regularity at the many (over twenty), N. & N.W. NSW and S.E. Queensland Games, then happily organised by local promoters. Bruce was a stalwart supporter of the MacKenzies, who then and continue now to direct the band's progress. Both Bruce and his late wife, Rosie were tireless workers for their Band, Church and Caledonian activities district wide.

Bruce urged the appointment of 'Wee Alec Maclean', (a.k.a. Piobaireachd Alex), as tutor/instructor with the band, a significant stride forward in their history. He proved a true 'drowthy crony' to Alex until the latter's untimely passing (c 1965). Alex had appreciated the help and friendship and reciprocated, teaching Bruce Ceol Mor and assisting him when he founded and taught the pipers of the successful Tamworth Junior Band whose numbers included Bruce's two sons, Malcolm and Lindsay, his future son-in-law Peter Bowden and not least, the extremely accomplished Athol Chalmers.

Like Bruce, who was also an accomplished saxophonist, his sons were excellent pipers and traveled far down the road to success as 'popular', more 'conventional', brass band instrumentalists. Both lads retain their love of piping but are recognised and esteemed for their professional musicianship with the Department of Education's school bands. His daughter, Heather, met with great success in her youth as a highland dancer and teacher and is now a highly regarded piano teacher and author.

Bruce will be long and affectionately remembered for his quality and love of life, family and piping: for his quick wit and smiling countenance. But I will ever remember him as I last saw him - a grey octogenarian, resplendent in his Black Watch suit, proudly competing as he always did in MacSweens "Mrs. Donald MacSwan" with a passion that was the epitome of the Great Highland Bagpipe.

Edinburgh Tattoo to come to Sydney - Graeme Webber - March 04, 2004

SYDNEY will host the Edinburgh Military Tattoo next year on the same site where Scottish settlers paraded their army drills more than a century ago.

A performance in Wellington four years ago was the only other time the Tattoo had been held away from the historic Edinburgh Castle gates.

Organisers say Scotland has strong cultural links with Australia and NSW Premier Bob Carr said the venue at Aussie Stadium was a fitting second home for the Tattoo. "It's an old colonial parade ground and the ghosts of long-dead redcoats long past will thrill to the skirling of pipes and the sound of fife and drum," Mr Carr said in a video message.

Chief executive and producer of the Tattoo, Brigadier Melville Jameson, said a condition of the move to Sydney was that a replica castle facade would have to be built in the stadium - featuring a drawbridge, sentry boxes and mountings for cannons on the ramparts. "I am happy to announce that Edinburgh Castle is being brought here and will sit somewhere down on the arena there to make us all feel at home," Brig Jameson said at the launch in Sydney today.

Australian bands have travelled to Scotland to take part in the celebration almost every year and all sectors of the Australian Defence Force (ADF) will make up a large part of the live entertainment for the biggest gathering of military and civilian musicians and dancers seen Down Under. With 83 pipe bands in Australia, Brigadier Jameson said there was plenty of local talent to choose from to build the cast of 1300 performers. "Loyalty is the watchword here and I will of course first be looking at those who have performed in Edinburgh," he said.

Regardless of the harsh Scottish weather, a Tattoo has never been cancelled since its inception in 1950 - though Brigadier Jameson said Sydney's summer heat would be a challenge for the heavily-clad marching bands.

ADF chief General Peter Cosgrove has welcomed the visit as a chance to highlight the longstanding relationship between Australian and British forces.

The word "Tattoo" originated from the cry of inn-keepers in the 17th and 18th centuries when bands would march through the streets at closing time signalling a return to quarters with the order "doe den tap toe" (turn off the taps).

More than 30,000 tickets will be sold for each of the four performances next February.

Megarity-Ross to become Megarity and Ross

The prominent Californian reedmaking business of Megarity-Ross is to split because Stephen Megarity has decided to live permanently in Scotland. As of 1 April, the existing firm will continue as *Ross Reedmakers* in Long Beach and a new firm, *Megarity Reeds* will start up in Kilmarnock.

Richard Parkes recovering from stroke

The Pipe-Major of the Field Marshal Montgomery Pipe Band, reigning RSPBA Grade 1 Champion of Champions from Belfast is recovering in hospital after suffering a stroke on 8 March. Early signs for his recovery are good. He had just returned from a weekend visit to the United States.

HOW TO GET TO THE BALMORAL BOWLS CLUB

For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is Map 160. Q12.

<u>From the Gateway Arterial</u>—turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Morningside RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the City—go</u> across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Morningside RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the west (old Cleveland Road</u>—Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right. Jean Howie Drive goes through the park (the entrance to the drive is near the boundary of the Bulimba Cemetery). Go about 350 metres along the Drive and turn right into the Bowls Club car park.
