APRIL 2004 MEETING

Our April meeting started out with a fairly small number (about 23) of participants at about 7.50 pm. Doug introduced Vaughn Parker as our first player and mentioned Vaughn had had considerable success at the recent Maclean Gathering. On a strong sounding pipe Vaughn gave us a fine selection of tunes including *Mrs Mary Grant, Colin's Cattle, Inveran, Dora MacLeod, Mozart on the Rampage, Judges' Dilemma, Whiskey Train* and *Isle of Jura*. The pipe was steady and well blown throughout, even in the trickier tunes. He showed excellent execution as well for the most part.

Next Doug Thoresen did some announcements and presented apologies. He mentioned the recent Celtic Aire display at Carindale Library and the forthcoming 4EB President's Ball and raffle.

Our Patron Maurie DeHayr put on his other hat as Piping Vice Principal of the Pipe Band College for Queensland and presented Luke Mann with the Elementary Certificate he had just gained from the College.

Doug introduced Vic Mackay who was visiting the meeting (he's subsequently joined the Society). He played a smallpipe comprising a practice chanter and a drone made by Malcolm McLaren and a reed by the same person. He introduced himself as having learned to play at 72 years of age (a few years ago). He had spoken to Rob Grogan who had told him that you could lay at pipers society without being laughed at! apologised in advance for the lack of fancy fingering. His selection of tunes included She Moved Through The Fair, Grannie's Highland Hame and an own composition, Remembrance Day Anthem. He wrote the latter after failing to get copyright permission to play "How Great thou Art" Remembrance Day function. It contains elements of "How Great Thou Art" and "Dumbarton's Drums)

The next piper was Luke Mann on a set of pipes Doug was getting going. After a bit of an initial struggle with the instrument he settled down and gave us a nice selection of tunes including *Cock O' The North*, *Hundred Pipers*, *Bonnie Dundee*, *79ths farewell*, *Green Hills* and *the The Battle's O'er*.

Doug spoke again and gave a review of the recent 100th Maclean Gathering.

Next to play was Stuart Charlton from BBC Old Collegians who has recently rejoined the Society. Stuart is now working at the school he used to attend. He had a clear and resonant sounding pipe and good execution and music in his selection which included the 3/4 Balmoral, 6/8 Bengullion,4/4 Lord Lovat's Lament, Invitation to the Dance (Air, 6/8 and then Jig) and finally the jig The Boys from Ballymote.

Maurie DeHayr also had his pipes to hand and was next to play. On a medium sounding and resonant pipe with good chanter-drone balance he gave us a good mix of tunes including the 9/8s Battle of the Somme and Heights of Dargai, the big 2/4s Abercairney Highlanders and Athol and Breadalbane Gathering, the 4/4 Sir Adam Thomson, finishing up with some song airs: Endearing Young Charms, Old Rustic Bridge and The Rowan Tree.

We then had the raffle draw with the lucky winner being May Maclean, and then commenced our supper.

Doug summoned us back together with a rousing selection. Although only playing two drones because of the continuing problem with his shoulder, the pipes had a sweet and nicely pitched sound with bright chanter tone. His tunes were *Redford Cottage*, *Dr Ross*, *Hills of Portuick*, *Donald Maclean's*

Farewell to Oban, Alick C MacGregor, P/M George Allan, Skyeman's Jig and Happy We've Been Together.

Iain Bruce was our final piper with his usual interesting selection and his usual excellent bagpipe which just became more resonant as he continued to play. His tunes included the ¾ Colin's Cattle, 6/8s Seumas MacNeill and The 72nd's Farewell to Edinburgh, airs The Fair Maid of Barra and An Anturachd Ard (apologies if I've transcribed that wrongly!), jigs The Tenpenny Bit, Paddy's Leather Breeches and Meg's Fancy and finally two big 2/4s, The Conundrum and John

MacDonald of Glencoe.

Doug announced that we have changed the format of our September meeting to a Ceilidh Night, with singing, dancing and other instruments. Although we will be organising some of the performances, no-one should feel excluded!

Finally the pipers for the evening played *Scotland the Brave* and *Marie's Wedding* together under Maurie's direction to finish up what had been an excellent and varied night of piping.

Maclean Centenary Gathering

While all Maclean Highland Gatherings are special events, this year's was even more so, because it was the Centenary Gathering. Many past attendees at the Gathering who haven't been for a while made special efforts to attend and wandering down the street on Friday night or around the Showground on Saturday was a certain way to come across many friends and acquaintances from the past. It's also surprising how many of them came from Maclean in the first place! It's been a great producer of contributors to pipers and pipe bands over many years.

In addition, the presence of the St Andrew's College Band from Christchurch, New Zealand helped to emphasise the special nature of this year. The College Band played at the concert in the street by the river on Saturday night and entertained the crowd for a long time, with able commentary from the Bandmaster, Chris Stevens, who took over the microphone from Bob MacPherson for the duration of their performance.

The weather was near perfect and we were spared the traditional shower at about 4pm in the afternoon as there was hardly a cloud to be seen.

As usual, there was solo piping everywhere in town on Friday night and at the Showground on Saturday morning and a large number of bands kept everyone entertained in the afternoon. Some Bands had even come along just to "play for points" to celebrate the centenary gathering, even though they are not registered for competition at present.

All competitors received a special certificate to commemorate their participation in the Centenary Gathering. The results of competitions are shown later in this newsletter.

Special congratulation to the Lower Clarence Scottish Association and especially the Secretary, Bob MacPherson, for putting on an event worthy of the centenary celebration for what has become one of the greatest meeting places for pipers in Australia.

CELTIC CELEBRATION COMMITTEES FEAST OF PIPING WEEKEND 8-9 May — QLD IRISH ASSOCIATION ROOMS

This year the committee added to its usual programme, which is the Australasian Final for pipers to attend the Lorient Interceltique Festival. In addition, they ran a Selection Competition on the Saturday with junior (elementary and sub-intermediate) and senior (intermediate and open) divisions. The test piece for this contest was a medley. The results off all the contests are printed later in this newsletter

Both days were most enjoyable. The quality of the bagpipes was very good and the playing generally of a high standard, both in technical and musical terms. The venue was most conducive to good playing – on the Saturday one of the smaller function rooms was used and on the Sunday the Tara Ballroom was the venue.

The selections on the Saturday were entertaining, with seven entries in the junior contest and nine in the senior. Especially in the senior division, a number of excellent performances weren't quite good enough for the prize list.

There were eight competitors in the Sunday competition, with the usual three test pieces: an MSR, Breton Selection and Irish Selection. Most of the criticisms that could be made would be on fairly fine points of detail. However, there remains a tendency, especially in the Irish Selection, for pipers to sacrifice rhythm and phrasing for sheer speed.

Congratulation to the Celtic Celebration Committee for another excellent event and we wish the Australasian competitors in Lorient all the best later in the year.

SOUTH BURNETT CALEDONIAN HIGHLAND GATHERING

Saturday 15 May dawned fine and clear with only a light breeze in Kingaroy – ideal conditions for another Kingaroy Gathering. A good entry had been received, despite the absence of both the "big" bands from Brisbane and also the grade 3 Bands. However, the full Band Grade 4 contest attracted six entrants and seven teams played in the mini-band contest. The morning was filled up with solos, so the sounds of the pipes were heard from 8 am till almost sunset. It was good to see a solid number of entries in the solos right up to Intermediate level.

The results are printed later in this newsletter. The day proceeded smoothly, despite a few last minute adjustments having to be made, and competitors co-operated in actually speeding up the program of events! Your scribe didn't get to hear any of the solos events, but the Band performances were overall very good. They were producing good sounds and also musical and well executed playing for the most part. Nerves sometimes took hold, however, and it was interesting to listen to bands playing for their March-Off Drill competition with a much fuller and more relaxed sound than they had just produced for their musical selection a few seconds earlier.

It was good to see the Qld Country competition band, which is a joint venture between South Burnett Caledonian and Lockyer Valley Celtic getting into the prize list, since a lot of them were also helping organise the contest.

Congratulations to the South Burnett Caledonian Pipe Band committee for an excellent day – we hope to see many more gatherings in the South Burnett in the years to come.

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NEWS

R.G. Hardie and Co under new ownership. The well-known bagpipe manufacturer, which since the 1970's has also included the Henderson brand, has been sold to Brian and Paul McComish, who also purchased The Band Room from Joe Noble in 2003. John Weatherston, who was Robert Hardie's partner and continued the business on after Hardie died in the 1980s, died in 2003. Iain MacLellan, who was associated with The Band Room when Joe Noble owned it, has continued with the firm.

Piping Hot festival – the five days before and the day after the World Pipe Band Championships. The National Piping Centre in Glasgow has obtained extensive sponsorship for this event, including £40,000 in funding from Glasgow City Council.

There will be recitals, workshops, and competitions at various venues across the city.

The National Piping Centre will host workshops and recitals, with Chris Armstrong, Bruce Gandy, Jack Lee, Willie McCallum, and Gordon Walker performing each afternoon. Open-air concerts in George Square will showcase international talent, including Finlay MacDonald, Scottish pipes, and Robbie Hannon, Uillean pipes, on the Monday; Kathryn Tickell, Northumbrian pipes, and Cristina Pato, Galicia, on Tuesday; Cristina Pato and Fred Morrison, Highland pipes, Wednesday; Jozsef Kozak, Hungary, and Na Tri Seadan Thursday; and Finlay MacDonald and Patrick Molard, Brittany, on Friday.

Pipe bands will perform each day in the square, as well as a "street activity" entitled which is designed to raise money for charity. To register for "Pipe Idol", individuals or groups must have some form of bagpipe in their line-up. They will basically busk in Glasgow at various sites to be agreed with the City. The winner of Pipe Idol will be the individual or group who raises the most money for charity. The winner will receive a £500 prize.

An invitational solo piping competition will be held at the National Piping Centre the day after the World's, featuring Jack Lee and Bruce Gandy (Canada); Jori Chisholm (USA); Willie McCallum, Angus McColl, Gordon Walker, Chris Armstrong and Iain Speirs (Scotland). Piper & Drummer Online originally broke the story of the new competition.

Fewer Annan Bands to remember. The Royal Burgh of Annan Pipe Band has been formed from a merger of the Annan Ex-Service Club and MacLean of Annan Bands. The new band will compete in Grade 3A. Annan Ex-Service Club had existed for more than 80 years. It reached the top of Grade 2 in the 1980s under the leadership Walter Cowan.

A familiar name takes over as lead drummer of the 78th Fraser Highlanders.

Drew Duthart is the band's new leading. He is the son of Alex Duthart, and played with several bands before joining the 78th Frasers, including the Peel Regional Police, the Metro Toronto Police, and Shotts & Dykehead. He was leading-drummer of the Metro Toronto Police when the band won the North American Pipe Band Championship twice in the 1990s.

Pre-World's Concert by Boghall & Bathgate. HOW TO GET TO THE BALMORAL BOWLS CLUB

For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is Map 160, Q12.

<u>From the Gateway Arterial</u>—turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Morningside RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the City—go</u> across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Morningside RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the west (old Cleveland Road</u>—Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right. Jean Howie Drive goes through the park (the entrance to the drive is near the boundary of the Bulimba Cemetery). Go about 350 metres along the Drive and turn right into the Bowls Club car park.

Letter to the Editor David Sinclair writes:

The (*Noosa and District*) Band presented a nice group of Irish airs at Irish Murphy's at Noosa Junction on St Patrick's Day. It was a great day for everybody. The event had been extensively advertised on our local Community Radio, and the crowd started to gather long before the starting time of 2.00pm. It was standing room only, but I was given a seat next to the Bass Drum. My own hat was removed by a lady who, in exchange, gave me a green Guinness hat complete with green helium balloon. John MacCormack, an old friend form the Celtic Tea Room of other days, had made a surprise appearance prior to the Band's performance, and played Danny Boy for me on an Irish whistle. I was given three especially made CDs of Irish music and songs for my birthday. So it was a wonderful day for St Patrick and for myself.

One of the songs on the CDs was "Come back Paddy Reilly", which reminded me of Irish and Scottish friends I had made over 50 years ago in North Queensland. So I set out to find this song. It is in Volume 4 of "Folksongs and Ballads Popular in Ireland". This is still a popular collection first published in Ireland in 1989. So what you say? I have some news that Colin Cairns, a pupil and friend of Doctor Barrie Orme, is making a collection, mainly of Irish ballads, which suit the Highland chanter. Again you will say, So What?

Well, Colin is a keen student of the Simon Fraser Canntaireachd, and he proposes to write the canntaireachd under the score of each ballad. The will help piobaireachd players to gain an understanding of how the MacCrimmon notation is expressed. What could be more helpful than a fine Irish song, which fits the chanter scale, laid out in canntaireachd so that the musician can learn to express the tune? A tune with which the musician is familiar? It will help the musician in turn to find the melody in the Barrie Orme – Simon Fraser Canntaireachd.

It is pleasing to learn from Barrie that the College of Piping continues to order more copies of his book. There are pipers in Scotland who have received videos made by Barrie demonstrating Ceol Mor movements with which they were not familiar. He reports that these videos have been enthusiastically received. The recipients are well known players in Scotland. Now some people are afraid that Simon Fraser's music demands that all Ceol Mor music of recent times is to be tipped on the rubbish heap, and that players of Ceol Mor must begin again. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Since about 1900 or a little earlier, settings of tunes and certain embellishments were lacking something as pipers lost track of the MacCrimmon Canntaireachd. In other words bits were missing. Simon Fraser merely replaced the missing bits. Dr Barrie Orme is the man who rescued Ceol Mor and pipers for generations will be in Simon Fraser's, and Dr Orme's debt. The demand for Barrie's book is increasing because it enhances the existing collections. It does not replace them. Barrie says that he does not intend to do a reprint of his book as the process is not profitable. He still offers his book at \$40. Editors Note: For those who may not have heard of Simon Fraser and Dr Orme before, there is a long running debate/controversy/argument (the sort of thing which pipers seem to frequently engage in!) on the authority to be given to various manuscripts and traditions in working out the way in which Piobaireachd should be played. As you can see, David is a strong proponent of the Simon Fraser canntaireachd in this regard. This debate and others have certainly led to an explosion of scholarship in relation to piobaireachd in recent years and have greatly enriched the understanding of the music and its origins, although the debate is likely to go on for as long as there are pipers to argue!
