MAY 2005 MEETING

Our May meeting featured the annual Patron's Trophy for senior players and we were pleased to have about 30 members and supporters, including five competitors, present.

President Doug Thoresen introduced the evening. We had apologies from Cory Dale and Donald Galloway. He also farewelled Malcolm McRae who is off on a trip to Scotland for the next few months and commented on the good month or so of Gatherings and Contests we had been enjoying.

Malcolm McRae was the judge for the contest and he had the Patron, Maurie DeHayr sitting with him.

Malcolm Supranowicz was the first competitor. His tunes were *Donald MacLellan of Rothesay Susan MacLeod* and *The Sheepwife*. This was a very musical performance on a good instrument.

Vaughn Parker played next and his tunes were *Colin Thompson*, *Tulloch Castle* and *Traditional* Reel. His performance was steady, with the reel sounding particularly nice.

The next competitor was Hazel Osborne with Braes of Castle Grant, Susan MacLeod and Lexy McAskill. Unfortunately, her playing was a bit affected by "contest nerves" but she nevertheless showed good technique and a good instrument

Jordan Whicker was next. His list of tunes didn't make it into my notes. He had a couple of unfortunate slips where he went off the tune. He did recover but unfortunately they put him out of contention for a prize.

Iain Bruce was the final competitor with *Duncan McColl, Caledonian Canal* and *Major Manson*. Another very nice performance on a good instrument.

Malcolm McRae gave his comments on the evening's playing. He mentioned favourably the good technique but said phrasing was the area where improvement could be made.

Maurie DeHayr gave a brief history of the contest, which was begun by the previous Patron, Archie Galloway, and continued by himself. In the course of this he noted that Iain Bruce who had competed tonight was the winner of the inaugural contest in 1981.

He then announced the results and presented the perpetual trophy, along with a miniature for the winner to keep. The results were:

Vaughn Parker next played us some more tunes in a relaxed fashion. They included *Battle of Waterloo, MacCrimmon Will Never Return, Jimmy Blue* and *James MacLellan's Favourite*.

Matthew Supranowicz gave us a few more tunes, starting with the 6/8s *Ballochyle* and *Bengullion*, the reels *Ca'* the *Ewes*, *Miss Proud and Lt Col D J S Murray* and the jig *Braes of Mellinish*. He finished up with the ground of the Piobaireachd *Lady Doyle's Salute*.

Finally Ian Bruce played an interesting selection: 6/8s *Auld Adam* and *Doreen and Iain* (the latter tune by Ron Fleming), air *Eilean A' Cheo* (by Donald MacKinnon) and a string of jigs- *The Tenpenny Bit, Paddy's Leather Breeches* and *Meg's Fancy*.

Maurie DeHayr then spoke about the knockout contest which will now start in June rather than May. The test piece is a 3-5 minute medley and it is run like a tennis tournament with "sudden death" matches Thanks to sponsorship from Wynnum RSL, we will be offering prizes totaling \$400. It was now time to draw the raffle and adjourn for supper and the usual chat.

The second of our Piobaireachd Meetings took place at Rochedale High School on Sunday 5th June.

In Malcolm McRae's absence, Iain Bruce introduced the day. We had apologies from Darin Cook, Alistair McInnes and Malcolm McRae.

The first tune was from Maurie DeHayr who played *All the Old Men Paid Rent but Rory*. While he was tuning up,lain Bruce gave some of the story about Bob Brown and Bob Nicol working out the way of this tune, as little but the written music has come down to us. Maurie's playing of it is rather off a Donald MacLeod tutorial tape (as recommended by Ian Morrison), which is an alternative to the Nicol-Brown interpretation. He also mentioned Lewis Turrell's advice about the tune - "Be aggresive".

After Maurie had played, there was some discussion. Iain mentioned that the tripling style of Taorluath was often followed by a Crunluath Fosgailte, as in this tune.

Max Yeo then played *Catherine's Lament* as he has been studying it with Malcolm McRae.

After a quick cuppa, Iain Bruce played our featured tune for the month: *The Glen is Mine.* This is regarded as a classic tune. Then Roy Gunn led all present in singing through the tune in unison, explaining the phrasing as we went. This was a very powerful way of helping everyone to fully appreciate how the tune is made, which cannot be derived from the printed music alone.

Matthew Supranowicz played *Lady Doyle's Salute* – a 19th Century tune by Angus MacKay. We heard the history of the tune from Roy Gunn's book (see advertisement elsewhere in this newsletter), read by Bernie Yeo. In discussion afterward, the undesirability of beating one's foot in an "a mach" variation was raised.

Our final tune for the day was from Roy Gunn, who played *Lament for Donald Duaghal (the grim) Mackay*. Ellie McCauley read the history from Roy's book. Roy was in good form and has now almost completely beaten the difficulties caused by the surgery on his hand, with almost all the Crunluaths rippling out on cue.

Finally, Maurie thanked everyone for attending and presented Jordan Whicker with the Elementary Piping Certificate he had recently sat for.

The next meeting will be on 10 July, followed by another on 7 August. Further dates to be advised.

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PIOBAIREACHD NOTES from Ian Og of Home Hill

Some reminiscences about the movement known as the Donald Mor run-down.

- 1. My first experience of the movement was a tape of Willie MacLean, who was one of the best pupils of Calum Piobaire. He played the first E long, followed by a D gracenote on a short B & A to a long low G. The D gracenote was a demisemiquaver, and certainly not themal. This was in MacLeods' Salute.
- 2. My second experience came with a conjoint lesson that lain Bruce and I had with Bob Brown in Brisbane in 1971. The tune was MacLeod's Controversy. Bob taught us to play a big themal D gracenote on the B, i.e. for the gracenote the D and little finger are off, with B and C on. He later played this tune in the recital he gave in Brisbane on 17 April 1971. Curiously, in the first phrase of the second line, he played a short D gracenote on B, although in the first line he played the themal gracenote as explained. Now this could have been an error of memory, but in the tapes he made for Dr MacKay in 1965, he does the same. In 1965 he must have been at his prime, so we conclude that the short D in line 2 was intentional.
- 3. I do not have any reference from Bob Bown on MacLeod's Salute or MacDonald's' Salute, but I received very careful instruction from Bob Nicol on the two Salutes and the Controversy, and was told "I had the Controversy" upon leaving. Bob Nicol played the Controversy with the big themal D gracenote long initial E themal D gracenote, short B & Arundown to long low G. BUT he played the D gracenote literally themal, as per scale D, i.e. D, C, B off, pinkie on. However he said that the one finger D as per Bob Brown was also acceptable, and I prefer this. Interestingly, he treated the first bar of line 2 with the themal D, in contrast to Bob Bown.
- 4. In MacDonalds' Salute, Bob Nicol played the rundown exactly as in the Controversy. But in MacLeods' Salute, he gave two ways of it. The first was as above, but he preferred the second, which is a cadence E to a short D gracenote on a long B and then down through a short low A to low G. He called the MacLeod's Salute the MacLeod's Rowing Tune. When he gave this to Sammy (*Sam Young Ian's son Ed*) he did not mention the first way as an alternative. You may lose prizes by playing the second method, but it is a style that definitely came from John MacDonald, and Nicol was famous for his playing of this tune.
- 5. General Thomason, in his book Ceol Mor, is ambiguous. He calls the tune MacLeod Of MacLeod's Rowing Piobaireachd. He has a mix of the two methods of playing the rundown. In the first bar of line 1 he has the rundown, but in the third bar he shows the long B. He reverts to the rundown in the other lines.
- 6. Willie MacLean and John MacDonald were both pupils of Calum Piobaire, but their styles show certain differences. Of course John MacDonald was also taught by the Camerons and the MacDonalds of Morar. In the matter of style, who is so rash as to be dogmatic?
- 7. Angus MacKay shows the rundown in the Controversy. He is consistent throughout and writes the D gracenote on B as a semiquaver. It is the same in MacDonalds' Salute, although in line 1, bar 4 and line 2, bar 1, the D gracenote is a demisemiquaver. These are probably misprints, and Bob Nicol opened them all. This is a magnificent tune.
- 8. In the Simon Fraser book, the Controversy has the long B and so does the MacDonalds' Salute. So also does the Rowing Tune, which is called The Lamentation for Donald MacLeod of Greshornish.
- 9. Other tunes of interest are Hector MacLean's Warning, Cluny MacPherson's Salute and Lady Doyle's Salute. In Binneas is Boreraig, the rundown is shown with a big D gracenote. Angus MacKay has the rundown in Hector MacLean, but the D gracenote is a demisemiquaver, which suggests Willie MacLean's way of playing in MacLeod's Salute. In Lady Doyle, Angus MacKay has the long B, but Binneas has the rundown.

David Sinclair reviews new book by Barry Orme

Dr Barrie James McL Orme has produced a very useful book which complements his other publications. Piobaireachd in the style of Simon and Hugh Fraser of Australia comprises 140 pages of explanations, illustrations, exercises and tunes which should be of interest to any Piper who would like to extend his or her musical horizon so as to establish an understanding of Ceol Mor or "Music Big" aka Piobaireachd. Doctor Orme has set the music out in large clear characters, with the Canntaireachd (ie transcribed vowel sounds) directly beneath the notes to which they relate. A trained singer could easily make a good job of any Ceol Mor theme using such a method and why for no? Simon Fraser called it "Pipe Language". For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is Map 160, Q12.

From the Gateway Arterial—turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Morningside RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the City—go</u> across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Morningside RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the west (old Cleveland Road</u>—Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right.
