APRIL 2005 MEETING

A good crowd of about 35 to 40 turned up for our April meeting including lots of people with their pipes – the table along the side of the room was just about filled with them!

Maurie DeHayr took on the announcing duties for the evening in the absence of President Doug Thoresen. Apologies were received from Doug Thoresen, Bob Payne and Dave Sinclair.

The first piper was Robert Baker. He had a good firm sound and played us a musical selection including *Garb of Auld Gaul, Wearing of the Green, Minstrel Boy, Cha till MacCrimmon* and *74th's Farewell to Gibraltar*. This was a confident performance.

Next to play was Philip Cowan. Philip had an injured hand from a car accident which was going to be operated on soon so he wanted to have a few tunes in case he isn't able to play for a while after the surgery. Maurie said that Philip was going to play till his hand got too sore! After a bit of fiddling with the pipes to get the drones right, they were sounding quite firm and he turned in some good fingering for someone with a hand injury. His selection included *Hector the Hero*, *Mist Covered Mountains* and a jig.

[Update – Philip reports on his surgery: I have recently undergone reconstructive surgery to my right hand and wrist to fix the damage done when my hand was ripped apart in my recent car accident and so far everything is turning out well. I got most of the movement back in my fingers the other day after a week of not being able to even wriggle them, and should be able to play pipes some time in the future. It's going to take 6 months for my wrist to heal in full, but although I'll be limited to what I can actually do with my 'new hand' I should be able to play bagpipes in fine form once again.]

Jordan Whicker is almost becoming a fixture at our meetings now and this evening was no exception. His pipes were sounding very nice and also his fingers. His selection included *Major Manson of Clachantrushal*, *La Boem*, *The Big Birl*, *The Braes of Mellinish*, *The*

Magpie, She Moved Through the Fair and Itchy Fingers.

Keeping with the younger set of pipers, Vaughn Parker was next to play. On a nice resonant pipe he started off with some wee tunes including *Mrs Mary Grant* and *Colin's Cattle*. With his pipes settled down, he launched into the 2/4 *Colin Thompson* and continued with *Tulloch Gorm, Traditional Reel, Jimmy Blue and James MacLellan's Favourite*. His performance was marked by strong confident fingers and expression which improves each time we hear him.

Michael Redmond was our next piper, not having played for us for a while. Maurie introduced him as one of the pipers to play next month for the right to compete in Lorient. He had a good strong pipe and started with some light but musical tunes including Kenneth J Macleod and Angus MacKinnon. Next he played for us the Breton selection he has been learning for the Lorient contest. Then back to the Scottish stuff with two fine 2/4 Marches -Major Manson of Clachantrushal and The Clan McColl. A short break to wipe the sweat from the brow & he went on with Caledonian Society of London and Brown Haired Maid before playing the piobaireachd The Glen is He finished off with College of St Anne's and John Patterson's Mare. Certainly a wide spectrum of music!

Ian Bruce was next to play. As usual his bagpipe did not disappoint. Listening to the 3/4's *The Shores of Argyll* and *Craigmillar Castle* it struck how even there he maintained an impeccable "Scottish snap". This carried on through the 6/8s *Murdo MacKenzie of Torridon* and another the name for which he couldn't remember. A couple of 2/4s followed – *The Conundrum* and *Mrs MacDonald of Dunach*. He finished up with *The Gordon's Salute*, introducing it with information from Roy's Gunn's new new book [see the advertisement elsewhere in this newsletter].

By now it was approaching ten but there was still time for Malcolm McRae to have a couple of tunes. Once again a good firm pipe and some solid and very musically rendered tunes including *Arniston Castle*, *The Grey Bob*, *My Home*, *Atholl and Bredalbane Gathering* and *The Australian Ladies*. As he went on the sound of the pipe steadily improved until the final Piobaireachd *Salute on the Birth of Rory Mor Macleod*.

Finally, Roy Gunn was prevailed on to have a tune. His pipe as usual had plenty of volume. His tunes included the 6/8s *The 1st Battalion Seaforth Highlanders, Farewell to Edinburgh* and *Dornkop*, the MSR *Father John MacMillan of Barra*, *Highland Harry* and *Bessie MacIntyre* and the Piobaireachd *Donald*

of Laggan, again introduced with information from the book.

By now it was certainly time for the raffle. Stephanie McRae was asked to draw the first prize and it was won by Jack Dearie. Second prize went to Innes Barker and third to Bob Cowan.

To finish off the evening, your scribe took over the announcing role to report that two members of the Society have been honoured with Celtic Honours by the Celtic Council of Australia (Qld) for contribution to Piping and Pipe Bands. They are our Paton Maurie De Hayr, and one of our longest standing members Sandy Campbell. All present gave a round of applause at this news.

Piobaireachd Meetings

The first of our Piobaireachd Meetings took place at Rochedale High School on Sunday 1st May. We had ten Piobaireachd players and a number of other interested people in attendance, and a number of apologies from others who plan to participate in the future, so this was a very auspicious start.

At the start Malcolm McRae led a discussion as to how we should structure the meetings. Out of this discussion, it was decided that we will initially meet monthly around the first Sunday of the month at Rochedale High School for 3 hours from 10am to 1pm. A fee designed to cover the rent of the hall will be charged (at the first meeting this was \$5 each but may decrease if we get more participants) Viability will be entirely dependent on being able to maintain numbers.

A committee of Alex McConnell, Malcolm McRae (with proxy Roy Gunn while Malcolm is away in Scotland in the next few months) and Iain Bruce will ensure that a number of people are arranged to play a tune at each meeting (not precluding others from playing). There also could be a particular featured tune for each meeting. The aim is for tunes to be played at a decent standard and there will be plenty of time for discussion. The committee will need to consciously introduce new tunes.

Given that the sound of the bagpipe is such a significant part of a Piobaireachd performance, we may look at having a bagpipe workshop at one of our meetings or as an additional one. Tuition will not be the purpose of the meetings, although members are certainly expected to learn form the experience of participating and listening. If there is a demand, it may be possible to look at some class-based tuition separately from the meetings.

After all that, it was time for a tune! Malcolm McRae led off by playing *Lament for Captain McDougal*l. In introducing the tune, he commented that the ground is very musical but that this is not very evident from the printed music – it's necessary to know how the tune goes. There is some variation as to how to play one phrase towards the end of the ground based on interpretation of various scores. Some play it with 5 pulses, but others with 4 – Malcolm plays 4. It contains a Taorluath Braebach and Crunluath Braebach.

Matthew Supranowicz then played *The Battle of Auldearn No 2*. Introducing it, he commented that it had "lots of variations". It includes a Tripling. In discussion afterwards Malcolm McRae commented that Matthew had lost the phrasing a little sometimes – especially in the Singlings of the Taorluath & Crunluath which became a little boring. He sang an example of the corrections he would make

lain Bruce played *Hector MacLean's Warning*. Discussion afterwards focused on the length of the E's preceding B's in the ground.

Roy Gunn then played *The Park Piobaireachd No 2*. He described it as having the sound of a Lament.

Finally Malcolm McRae played *The Lament for Mary MacLeod* – Mary was reputedly a Skye poetess who had an affair with a MacCrimmon piper.

Maurie DeHayr expressed the thanks of those present to Malcolm for starting off this new venture within the Society and some more discussion about the next meeting followed.

NEWS

Ipswich International Tattoo on Stage – Take 2

Last year Ipswich Thistle Pipe Band staged a very successful and entertaining event and they had the courage to follow it up with another this year on 16-17 April. The venue changed this year to the Ipswich Civic Hall, which is much more "theatre-like" than the large auditorium used last year.

Their courage was amply rewarded, with an even better production than previously. The line up of acts included the Nunukul Yuggera Indigenous Dancers, the Viva la Musica Orchestra, Australia's Federation Precision Drill Team, the Amberley Cadet Brass Band, a number of Pipe Bands in addition to the hosts, the Cambrian Youth Choir, the Thistle Highland Dancers, QIA Dancers and solo singers.

The Massed Bands were very good despite the

small stage. The compere was invisible and tightly scripted, which kept good feeling of continuity throughout.

Despite there being a bit of a low spot in the middle of first half and the orchestra not having quite the same "bite" as the last year, all the acts were professionally presented and entertaining. The indigenous dancers and the drill team were particularly impressive, without wanting to take anything away from the other acts.

"Black Bear" at the end worked really well despite the massed band splitting in two and marching out down the aisles at each side of the theatre- I was waiting for it to disintegrate but it didn't!

Congratulations are due to Ipswich Thistle for this excellent production, which is mounted with only minimal opportunity for rehearsal and which came at the end of a very active period for the Band, with their trip to New Zealand for the National Championships where they won Grade 4 and then to

Maclean for the Highland Gathering at Easter where they came 2nd in Grade 4.

Tommy Pearston, 1921-2005 - died on May 4 at the age of 84.

Tommy Pearston co-founded the College of Piping with Seumas MacNeill in 1944, but because of his relatively quiet and unassuming nature he lived in MacNeill's shadow. He was instrumental in the development of the Institute of Piping, and set about with MacNeill to create the first organized civilian teaching system since the MacCrimmons. Today's College of Piping owes as much to Tommy Pearston as it does to Seumas MacNeill.

As a competitor he was known most for his talent in piobaireachd, and he won the Highland Society of London's Gold Medal in 1968.

Tommy Pearston's funeral took place on May 9 at Linn Crematorium in Glasgow. He is survived by his wife, Betty, his son, Douglas, and daughter, Sheila.

Robert played twice, with each bracket including a piece of Ceol Mor. In the first stint he played the very melodic nameless tune *Hiharin dro a dro* and in the second *The King's Taxes*.

Along with this there was plenty of good light music across the whole range for the Highland Bagpipe. All this despite Robert's bagpipe making heavy weather of the transition from Glasgow to Adelaide to Sydney and then Brisbane in a week or so! Combined with rainy and humid weather in Brisbane this led to large amounts of water on the reeds by the end of his first bracket and much drying out before the second one.

After the recital there was a good chance for those present to meet and talk with our visitor. He extended an invitation for all to visit the College of Piping whenever they are in Glasgow.

We also took the opportunity to present to him for the College Museum a "Brian Boru" chanter made by Henry Stark of London. This was donated by Jock Stewart, a long time member of this Society who can unfortunately not get to meetings very frequently because he lives near Stanthorpe and is unable to drive long distances. Jock had the chanter restored before sending it to us to present to Robert.

Celtic Celebration Committee Contests 14-15 May

As has become traditional, mid-May saw the committee run its Feast of Piping weekend. The Saturday was devoted to an own choice selection divided into junior and senior divisions. As your scribe only got there for the last player, he can't comment in any detail but by all reports it was an excellent afternoon of piping in the very conducive surroundings of of the Queensland Irish Association's Tara Ballroom. The results are in the Contest Results section.

On the Sunday there was an excellent crowd of around ninety back in the Tara Ballroom to listen to the Scottish, Breton and Irish selections played by each of the seven competitors, who were Cory Dale (Qld), Matthew Supranowicz (Qld), Martin Frewen (NZ), Andrew Kuiler (NSW), Sen Hodgman (ACT), Michael Redmond (Qld) and Casey Wilkes (NZ).

For the first time there was a judge from each of the Scottish, Breton and Irish Piping worlds (Robert Wallace - Principal of the College of Piping Glasgow, Michel Le Tenier Vice President Bagad de Lorient, Adrian Jefferies Professional Irish musician and uilleann piper, Australia).

The afternoon was ably compered by Tom McGirr, who has recently been recruited to serve on the Celtic Celebration Committee, and the competitors played their MSR and Breton selection first (with just a re-tune between the two), coming back later in the same order to play their Irish Selection.

We certainly heard much interesting music and some very good bagpipes, which must have tested the judges. The final result is that Casey Wilkes, Mathew Supranowicz and Martin Frewen will represent Australasia in Lorient this year.

Robert Wallace on behalf of the judges congratulated the competitors and made favourable comments about the standard of playing. He suggested that it is not always a good idea for pipers to spend a long time tuning on the boards, because this sometimes leads to putting the bagpipe out of tune rather than into it. He also commented that all three traditions of music represented in the competition need to have their music played with good "lift" and expression. Aiming for absolute maximum speed in playing will sometimes work against the music and should be avoided.

Jean-Pierre Pichard from the Festival Interceltique de Lorient also spoke and urged us to have a long term plan to develop a public for our music. He said that at the end of WWII there were perhaps 12 pipers left in Brittany and the local piping nearly died out to be replaced by Scottish and Irish piping, but after many decades of effort in building a public for Breton piping, they now have 20,000 pipers and can attract crowds of 80,000 to piping events.

Finally, we should make the committee's task less of a thankless one by thanking them: Kathleen O'Malley (official delegate of the Festival Interceltique de Lorient), Geoff Goward, Alan and Jane Hancox, Robert and Christine Wilson and Tom McGirr. They put in a great effort to organise this event each year and piping in this part of the world is richer for their efforts.

HOW TO GET TO THE BALMORAL BOWLS CLUB

For those who like to work out their own directions the UBD Reference is Map 160, Q12.

<u>From the Gateway Arterial</u>—turn north at the Lytton Road intersection (just south of the bridge), travel along Route 24 and the Route 23 (Wynnum Road) till you see the Morningside RSL on your left. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the City—go</u> across the Story Bridge, left into Shafston Avenue, then into Lytton Road and Wynnum Road (Route 23). Go along Wynnum Road until you see the Morningside RSL on your right. Turn in as if going to the RSL but go right through their carpark and continue along Jean Howie Drive for about 350 metres. Turn left into the Bowls Club car park.

<u>From the west (old Cleveland Road</u>—Turn into Bennetts Road. Continue along Bennetts Road, across the railway line and a park will appear on your right. Jean Howie Drive goes through the park (the entrance to the drive is near the boundary of the Bulimba Cemetery). Go about 350 metres along the Drive and turn right into the Bowls Club car park.
