SEPTEMBER MEETING

About 25 members and guests were present for our September meeting, which was a piper's night, but also featured a talk from Iain Bruce.

In the absence of President Reg O'Malley, your scribe introduced the evening. We had apologies from Reg and Glenys O'Malley, Tom McGirr, Roy Gunn and Joan O'Neill.

To start off the piping, Matthew Supranowicz played a few tunes including *The Battle of Waterloo*, *Flett from Flotta*, *Wee Highland Laddie*, *She Moved Thro' the Fair, The Braes of Mellinish, Macleod of Mull, Jean Mauchline*, *Bruce Gandy's Farewell to the Iron Horse*, *Donald MacLellan of Rothesay*, *Susan MacLeod and Lt Col D J S Murray*.

Next Jim Johnston was asked to give a brief description of a new CD produced by 4EB called *Scots of the South East*. It mainly contains 18th and 19th century poetry, interspersed with fiddle and dance music.

Our next player was James Doran His tunes included the 6/8 Miss Isabelle T MacDonald, slow air Shoreline of Lewis, McGuire's Jig, an MSR consisiting of P/M Willie Grey's Farewell to the Glasgow Police, The Caledonian Canal and a reel that he couldn't remember the name of. These were followed by The Novocastrian Tatto, 51st Highland Divsiion, Bare Foot Through Brisbane and Highland

Laddie.

Iain Bruce then gave his talk. Your scribe took some notes of the highlights and these are reproduced below - all responsibilites for errors or omissions are mine, not Iain's!

lain and his daughter Morag have recently returned from a memorable trip of five weeks starting with a visit to Gracelands for the Elvis Presley anniversary – lain compared the structue of the Blues with some Piobaireachd and speculated that piping had had some influence on the development of the Blues.

They then went on to Scotland, to poor weather and traffic congestion! The first piping appointment was at Oban for the Argyllshire Gathering. At the Corran Halls in Oban he was sighted by Sam Young and introduced to a piper called Meg from Armidale who has been learning from Tom Spiers. Murray Henderson was surprised by seeing him (lain) in the audience.

lain noted that fine Piping is still an esoteric activity, with not many people in attendance despite the good quality of playing. He found listening to be a new experience – he had always competed before when in Scotland and it was different to be in the audience. Overall he was a little disappointed by the standard with either poor style, poor intonation or poor tuning detracting from some performances. He mentioned that Gordon Walker played very well in the

Senior Piobaireachd, with an excellent pipe and a great tune (*Bells of Perth*). It was the winning performance. He also was impressed by the former winners MSR competition.

Next day was Games Day, including the march to the field by the competitors starting from Station Square. One of the traditional tunes played is the *Argyllshire Gathering* but this year they even played *The Little Cascade* on the march! lan was not very impressed by the noise, lack of places to sit, bad toilets, etc.

He then gave some impressions of the Northern Meeting in Aviemore. During the refurbishment of the Eden Court Theatre in Inverness where the contest was formerly held, it was found that it was originally very poorly built, so costs have escalated, but it is now nearly finished and the Northern Meeting may go back there in future years. Aviemore is very high class. lain reported that one senior player told him that the theatre is not ideal - there is an air conditioning buzz and the theatre also soaks up sound. lain spoke with the Secretary and Treasurer of Piobaireachd Society and various other people. He heard one tune in the Silver Medal -Margaret Dunne - and it turned out to be the winning performance. He found himself at one point sitting next to Bob Kilgour formerly of the Scots Guards. He listened to the Clasp competition and the former winners MSR. featured very precise playing but perhaps not as convincing as he remembered from the past.

They also went to the Braemar Gathering which hadn't changed since lain was last there (as a competitor). It is a great public spectacle — with the serious piping away from the main field. The Queen arrives about 1pm and stays for an hour or two. Again, there was noise, lack of seating and bad toilets! He was a bit disconcerted to find a speaker tied to the cairn in memory to the Bobs of Balmoral near to the Piobaireachd platform. Some general comments about the piping included some younger players with very poor posture. Also, the standard of tuning was not always good: the drones might be tuned together but not to the chanter. Another point was poor "tuning phrases" and many people stopping one tenor while tuning.

The journey home was made rather more stressful by a delay for 7 hours at Inverness airport leading to a missed international conection and an overall delay of 24 hours - the joys of international travel.

Finally Vaughn Parker played us a few tunes including The High Level, Biddy from Sligo, James MacLellan's Favourite, Loch of the Birds, Jolly Tinker, In and Out of the Harbour, Rakish Paddy and Frances Mouton's. His pipe was not going particularly well at the start but improved during his performance.

The raffle was drawn by Helen Doran and won by Sandra Supranowicz and we adjourned for supper.

Piobaireachd Group

Our October Meeting started with eight in attendance and finished with eleven. Malcolm McRae and Iain Bruce were back from their travels, although Roy Gunn was unable to be there.

Malcolm started off the piping with *The Bicker* after a bit of a warm up. He was followed by Tom McGirr with *Lament for Alasdair Dearg MacDonnell of Glengarry*. The pipes were not quite "on song" but the performance was enjoyable. Malcolm commented that it is a fine little tune which has been played in senior competition. Malcolm commented that it usually is played with an a'Mach because of a lack of singlings in the variations. Tom McGirr asked about whether an a mach should be played in *Too Long in this Condition*. Malcolm said that the tune is a fosgailte tune and there are two schools of thought. One is to play an open fosgailte as an a mach but there is another opinion that the open and closed fosgailte should not be mixed in a tune (which is his own view). It is really a matter of preference and style but Malcolm's opinion is that it dosen't really add anything.

Yasu Hamilton was the next player with *The Earl of Seaforth*. She had learned the tune by listening to Bob Brown sing and play parts of it on a Masters of Piobaireachd CD and also listening to a recording of Iain Duncan playing it right through. This was an example that others could follow.

Iain Bruce then played the *Marquis of Argyll's Salute*, which he had learnt from Jimmy MacIntosh. Ian Davidson read the story of the tune from Roy's book.

Next we looked at the set tune for the day, *The Old Woman's Lullaby*. The tune has various names and was at one stage set for the Clasp (but not since the 1970s), although it lacks advanced variations. Malcolm warned against slipping into playing it in half phrases, rather than flowing right through the phrases. After singing through the tune, we broke for morning tea and afterward Malcolm played it on the pipe.

Finally we had two more tunes - Matthew Supranowicz playing *Lament for the Viscount of Dundee* (using his new MC² chanter) and Vaughn Parker playing *Kinlochmoidart No 1*.

Once again a very full and enjoyable meeting.
